Va**LENT**ine's Day

Sunday is the last Sunday after the Epiphany, the time in the church year where the focus is on seeing and experiencing the glory of Christ. The readings have helped to experience the glory of Christ in his baptism, teaching, signs, and wonders, so our eyes become open to Jesus, the one who sets his face steadfast toward Jerusalem and the cross. Sunday the Church rehearses Jesus' Transfiguration on a mountain with Peter, James, and John. While the Transfiguration of Jesus has its own feast day—August 6th, the transfiguration readings are included for the last Sunday after the Epiphany.



The Transfiguration descent is a vision of glory that leads us to Ash Wednesday and the beginning of our Lenten journey to the cross. The forty days of Lent allow us to make space in our hearts and lives for God's resurrection work. It is fitting that the Ash Wednesday holy day falls on Valentine's Day this year, the ultimate "heart holiday."

Ash Wednesday, is an annual reminder of our mortality, but also of love and life. The image of an ash cross connected to a heart above is a visual reminder that each of us is created in love and for a life of love. We use ashes because it is one of nature's strongest nutrients. We are marked with ash to strengthen our faith and grow to share the life of God as we walk the Way of Love. We receive ashes as a sign of our mortality and penitence, reminding us that only by the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ are we given eternal life.

I invite you this VaLENTine's Day to return to the Lord, your God, for God is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and abounding in steadfast love. Get your ash in church (worship at 12:00 noon), or at an Ashes-To-Go location:

The Reverend Absalom Jones (1746-1818) was born into slavery; he purchased his own freedom and his family's freedom, and was a civic and spiritual leader of enslaved and free Blacks in Philadelphia. Moved by righteous anger and courageous visionary faith, Jones led a departure of Blacks from St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church, where worship became segregated. He was one of the leaders to establish the African church which became the African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas. This was the first church founded by people of African descent in the Episcopal church and it is still an active congregation. Jones was ordained an Episcopal priest in 1802. Absalom Jones was declared a "saint" in the Episcopal Church in 1973; since then, the celebration of his feast day on February 13th has become part of the official church calendar.





Challenge: Did you know that Lent begins on Valentines Day? Also, sad new from Families in Transition that they have closed Hope House which helped unhoused families in our school district.



Thursday Afternoon Bible Study


