Lent may originally have followed Epiphany, just as Jesus' sojourn in the wilderness followed immediately on his baptism, but it soon became firmly attached to Easter, as the principal occasion for baptism and for the reconciliation of those who had been excluded from the Church's fellowship for apostasy or serious faults. This history explains the characteristic notes of Lent – self-examination, penitence, self-denial, study, and preparation for Easter, to which almsgiving has traditionally been added.

Traditionally Lent is a time for candidates for baptism to be instructed in Christian faith, and as repentant people prepared themselves, through fasting and confession, to be readmitted and/or reconciled to the church, the entire faith community was invited to join them in the process of study and repentance. This by extension over forty days, would remind them of the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness, being tested by Satan.

Lent is a time to lean into the compassion and forgiveness that belong to the Lord our God, because we have rebelled against God. Lent is a time to renounce our willfulness and ask God for mercy by confessing our sins. Here are some reflections to guide your journey this week:

- **Today:** Where can you go and intentionally provide kindness? Read Matthew 5:4
- **Saturday:** How does our community help or hinder your growing in Christ? Read John 1:12-13
- **Sunday:** Experience worship in person or online this first Sunday in Lent
- Monday: Who has taught you to live a Jesus-filled life? Who have you taught? Read 2 Corinthians 4:16
- **Tuesday:** How do you incorporate rest into your life? Read Jeremiah 6:16
- **Wednesday:** Go for a walk today and pray with your feet, each step with intention. Read Isaiah 2:3a
- Thursday: How do others experience the love of Christ you bring? Read Galatians 5:22-23

# All Saints Community Labyrinth Project F.A.Q. for February 16<sup>th</sup>



Pastor Bill introduced the Community Labyrinth Project recently during his remarks at our annual meeting. As we discern and plan, you may have questions about labyrinths and each week we will share a frequently asked question here. Feel free to ask any questions of Pastor Bill or Linda Brown who are both trained labyrinth facilitators by <a href="Veriditas">Veriditas</a> the non-profit organization committed to inspiring transformation through the labyrinth experience. The word "Veriditas" originated with Hildegard of Bingen and means "the greening power of life".

# Why a Labyrinth?

For centuries Christians have utilized different practices by which to engage in prayer, meditation, discernment, and service. One of the most ancient practices has been that of walking prayer. The ancient Christians used the practice of pilgrimage to and from Jerusalem as a symbol of their spiritual path with Jesus Christ. As Christianity spread all around the Mediterranean basin and eventually around the world, pilgrimage to Jerusalem was not always possible and so Christians began using the natural pattern of labyrinths as a spiritual practice by which to engage in walking prayer. From that first walk from Jerusalem on the road to Emmaus Christians have believed that our spiritual struggles are solved "by walking" as St. Augustine once said. It is by walking with Christ both literally and spiritually that we find our identity as Christians.

People of faith all over the world are longing for spiritual transformation, wisdom, identity and a path to walk. The labyrinth has once again made its beautiful path available to us as churches and hospitals and parks have begun making labyrinths available to give people the sacred space to encounter the Holy and to pray. We hope to welcome people to experience a place of peace in the All Saints courtyard.








# **Thursday Afternoon Bible Study**




# Winter/Spring 2024


