Holy Eastertide!

Beloveds,

Our liturgical celebration of Jesus Christ's resurrection which began with the Easter Vigil and the Resurrection of Our Lord Easter Sunday inaugurates the start of *Eastertide*, a unique 50 day season of the church calendar that ends with Pentecost. It is a festive continuation and observance of Jesus' victory over sin, darkness, and death through his resurrection. It is the oldest part of the Church Year and is directly derived from the fifty-day period in the Jewish calendar, which began with Passover and concluded with Pentecost (the Greek term for "fiftieth day").


The Lord's death and resurrection took place at Passover, and its completion—the empowering of the apostles by the Holy Spirit—took place on Pentecost. These are

The Collect of the Day

Almighty and everlasting God, who in the Paschal mystery established the church's original feast days, which in very early times were both moved to the Sundays following the Jewish festivals, because of the early church's intense reverence for the first day of the week as the Lord's Day, the Day of Resurrection. The early Christians considered every Sunday to be a celebration of the rising of Christ and of the coming of the Holy Spirit—a repetition of Easter and Pentecost.

While we celebrate Jesus' resurrection every Sunday with the Liturgy of the Eucharist, these 50 days of Eastertide provide for us a particular opportunity to focus on the spiritual ascetic of Christ's sacrificial "action" on the Cross, and to do so joyfully. Liturgically this is reflected in our use of the Easter Proclamation *"The Lord is Risen!"*, the Hymn of Praise "Now the Feast and Celebration", the hymns we sing, the Holy Scripture we hear, the vestments; and our sense of deliverance from the bonds of fear.

The Paschal Candle, symbolizing the *Light* of *Christ*, sits prominently in the sanctuary among us alit to provide continuing inspiration for us to hear and discern the *Word made Flesh* as we grow into a deeper relationship with the risen Christ. Eastertide is the Christian season, meaning it defines the truths of the faith we affirm, the baptismal waters we give thanks for, and the bread of heaven and cup of salvation we share, healing and restoring us, reassuring and strengthening us through our risen Lord.

Christ is Risen. He is Risen Indeed! *Bill+*

P.S. Sunday we welcome back The Rev. Jane VanZandt (be sure to wish her a happy birthday!) as I take time for rest and restoration following Holy Week. In Sunday's gospel the risen Christ appears to the disciples and offers them the gift of peace. Even amid doubts and questions, we experience the resurrection in our Sunday gathering around word and meal, and in our everyday lives. Throughout the coming Sundays of Easter the first two readings will be from the Acts of the Apostles and the first letter of Peter. Even as the early Christians proclaimed the resurrection, we rejoice in the new covenant of reconciliation: Grant that all who have been reborn into the fellowship of Christ's Body may show forth in their lives what they profess by their faith; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.



Information Session on Sponsoring an Afghan Hazara Family Sunday, April 16th during coffee hour following 10:00 am worship



All Saints Seeks to Sponsor an Afghan Family to Immigrate to NH

Amadou Hamady will join Sarah Day and Warren Muir at the coffee time in the parish hall after the 10am service to brief parishioners about our upcoming efforts to help seven Afghans to immigrate to safety in NH.

You will be introduced at the briefing to an Afghan Hazara family with members Warren has tutored over the past eight years online. You also will learn about the Federal Welcome Corps program, which has recently been announced, that will enable groups of private citizens to nominate specific refugees to immigrate to the US. Group members pledge to help refugees settle and to become self-sufficient in the US the same way official refugee settlement agencies like IINE (where Amadou was program director) are paid to do.

The Mission Outreach Team recommended, and the Vestry approved, the parish participating in this effort and establishing a dedicated account for associated financial contributions and expenditures. Hopefully, this Welcome Corps effort will be an opportunity for All Saints and its parishioners to welcome in-person refugees (whom we know about in advance) and to support them to become self-sufficient New Americans in New Hampshire.



April 18, 25 - <u>An Inconvenient Apocalypse: Environmental Collapse, Climate</u> <u>Crisis, and the Fate of Humanity</u> by Wes Jackson and Robert Jensen

May 9, 16, 23 - Demon Copperhead a novel by Barbara Kingsolver

Wolfeboro Reads – Two Weeks Only: April 18 and 25 An Inconvenient Apocalypse by Wes Jackson and Robert Jensen

Jackson and Jensen examine how geographic determinism shaped our past and led to today's social injustice, consumerist culture, and high-energy/high-technology dystopias. The solution requires addressing today's systemic failures and confronting human nature by recognizing the limits of our ability to predict how those failures will play out over time. Though these massive challenges can feel overwhelming, Jackson and Jensen weave a secular reading of theological concepts--the prophetic, the apocalyptic, a saving remnant, and grace--to chart a collective, realistic path for humanity not only to survive our apocalypse but also to emerge on the other side with a renewed appreciation of the larger living world.


