
Throughout the Torah, God reminds the chosen people of Israel that they have been chosen in order to be a blessing to the world. The Israelites' status as "a priestly kingdom and a holy nation" (Exodus 19:6) is not a self-serving designation. Rather, their calling is to pursue justice and righteousness in order that the communities around them might also flourish. Similarly, in Sunday's gospel, Jesus invites his disciples to turn outward and work for the healing of communities to which they travel. We are invited to consider whether our chosen communities, including All Saints, exist primarily for the sake of members, or if they extend outward into the wider world.

Juneteenth and the Emanuel Nine



Juneteenth speaks to God hearing the cries of enslaved people in America and setting into motion all that went into the freedom of enslaved people in the United States." Juneteenth reminds us that we must try to understand and talk about American slavery and its legacies. It is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation - which had become official January 1, 1863.

Emanuel Nine, martyrs, 2015. On June 17, 2015, Clementa C. Pinckney, Cynthia Marie Graham Hurd, Susie Jackson, Ethel Lee Lance, DePayne Middleton-Doctor, Tywanza Sanders, Daniel Lee Simmons, Sharonda Coleman-Singleton, and Myra Thompson were murdered by a self-professed white supremacist while they were gathered for

Bible study and prayer at the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church (often referred to as Mother Emanuel) in Charleston, South Carolina. We are called to repent of the sins of racism and white supremacy which continue to plague our society and pray for the peace which passes all understanding and breaks down walls of fear and hatred.

O God, you made us in your own image and redeemed us through Jesus your Son: Look with

compassion on the whole human family; take away the arrogance and hatred which infect our hearts;

break down the walls that separate us; unite us in bonds of love; and work through our struggle and

confusion to accomplish your purposes on earth; that, in your good time, all nations and races may

serve you in harmony around your heavenly throne; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. [BCP


