The Collect of the Day

The prayer appointed for each Sunday that "collects" or captures the theme of the day or season of the Church year. It summarizes the attributes of God as revealed in the Eastern religions are best known for the theme of "waking up" as a defining element of spiritual growth. Paul writing to the early followers of the Way of Love in Rome calls on them to wake up to see what is going on around them and "put on the armor of light" to face the challenges of the day. Waking up suggests that we see things differently than we are accustom to, and be moved to act. To follow the Way of Love is to see things with Jesus' eyes and to do God's renewing work with our hands, bodies and spirit—in love for people and planet alike.

This passage reminds us of the present urgency...

- · For our neighbors against rising tides of white supremacy, threats to basic human rights for gender and sexual minorities, the divide between rich and poor, and whether our constitutional republic will continue to be a model of freedom, or choose to become an ethno-cratic, intolerant, authoritarian state like Hungary, India, Israel, and Turkey.
- For our planet against the clear and present danger of climate change resulting in wildfires, heatwaves and flooding that are our present reality. We can choose to ignore these, or celebrate creation by participating in cleanups, planting trees and reducing our carbon footprint—all immediate actions we can take.

We are reaching tipping points, as the future of our country and creation are at stake and we face leaving a bleak and barren future for our children, children's children and all of creation.

Now is not the time to be complacent. In the words of the late great prophet Archbishop Tutu:

"If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor. If an elephant has its foot on the tail of a mouse, and you say that you are neutral, the mouse will not appreciate your

the mouse will not appreciate your neutrality."

So as people of faith we are called to act—drawing strength from our shared Eucharistic celebration, from songs of joy and lament, and the love we have for neighbors and for creation. We do this empowered by the very Spirit of God,

scriptures for the day.

Grant us, O Lord, to trust in you with all our hearts; for, as you always resist the powerful who oppress and dominate Creation, so you never forsake your creatures who live in harmony with nature's order; through Jesus Christ the Wisdom of Creation, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. Amen.



SEPTEMBER 1 — OCTOBER 4



I also invite you to think about what we as a faith community are already doing to care for creation and what more we could be doing. Visit the website: The Episcopal Church website for



Mj Pettengill is a local author of three historical fiction novels. The first novel, *Etched in Granite*, was inspired by an encounter in Ossipee, NH, which she says forever changed her. It was a snow-covered hillside where Mj saw 298 numbered gravestones. It became her mission to identify those nameless people, and that story itself is fascinating.

From the Etched in Grante Preface:

"Some of us may have heard references made to the Poor Farm in jest, but we do not comprehend the

depth of its meaning. I believe that it's worth knowing what it means to be a pauper in the late 19th century and what it means today. It's a part of our story."

Mj has written three books based on this topic – *Etched in Granite, The Angels' Lament,* and *Down from the Tree.*









September Bible Study






