Advent 2023 The Weary World Waits.

Crying out in the wilderness.

Beloveds of All Saints,

Advent is a season of expectation, the word itself meaning "coming." Many families spend these four weeks waiting for children to come home from college, to prepare to travel to spend Christmas with loved ones, or for relatives to come for Christmas dinner. For young children, these days of waiting can seem like a thousand years. Others are amazed at how quickly time is flying, as they sense the end of their own lives drawing near. While for some struggling with loneliness or loss, the season cannot be over quick enough.

As we experience the season of Advent, we recall stories from the past that are told and retold as a way of remembering the significance of these waiting days. The beginning of Mark's gospel begins to build a

Advent carries two simultaneous visions of our expectations: we await yet again the birth of the babe in the manger, and we also await Chris's coursing again to fulfil all things. We often prepare for -lakent by "setting ready": planning, organizing, and ordering supplies for various gathering and workship services. Yet preparing for the coming of Christ is not a matter of haring everything under control. Christ's arrival disrupts disrupts injustices, and the chemes in a society in which we are deeply embedded. A prayer for Christ to come to us is a prayer for a holy disruption of our lives that we cannot control and that we might straugel to accept.

A defining event —John baptizing in the wilderness—and foreshadowing of the one who will bring about reconciliation and resurrection set the stage for the narrative that will follow.

Whether you enjoy or dread this time of year, come to worship on Sunday to listen and wonder how does this gospel story setup foreshadows and shapes how you experience what is to come. Our sending blessing in Advent recognizes the expectant nature of the season:

May you trust in whatever sacred thing bubbles up from within you.

May you remember that the Divine takes on flesh and yours is no exception.

May you be a conduit of eternal love, and a moment of grace

for a world that waits and longs for hope. In the name of the one who + creates, saves and sustains you. *Amen.*

Secondly, this poem by German theologian and poet, Rainer Maria Rilke *(The Book of Hours, Book I, Poem 45)* strikes a chord as we begin our Advent journey.

You come and go. The doors swing closed ever more gently, almost without a shudder. Of all who move through the quiet houses, you are the quietest. We become so accustomed to you, we no longer look up when your shadow falls over the book we are reading and makes it glow. For all things sing you: at times we just hear them more clearly. Often when I imagine you your wholeness cascades into many shapes. You run like a herd of luminous deer and I am dark. I am a forest. You are a wheel at which I stand, whose dark spokes sometimes catch me up, revolve me nearer to the center. Then all the work I put my hand to widens from turn to turn.

The editors of the online S.A.L.T. publication added these thoughts: "....we hold in mind that this Child of Humanity is also none other than God, the One who exceeds all forms and dwellings. An "arrival," that is, of the One who is always with us and within us, a great wheel, a running herd in a dark forest, a gently opening, closing, opening door.

As the season of Advent begins, Rilke helps us contemplate the quiet, astounding mystery of the Incarnation: a God who comes and goes, and even so, a God in whom all things turn."

Christmas 2023 in the Holy Land

Our image of a Bethlehem birth where 'all is calm and all is bright' does not reflect the realities of Bethlehem at the incarnation, nor today. God is with us, breaking into our world, accompanying and comforting the suffering as shown in the nativity from Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem below. For the first time in modern history, there will be no Christmas tree or Christmas celebrations in Bethlehem. The birth of the Prince of peace will be celebrated in holy services only.



Christmas Church Pastor the Rev. Munther Isaac notes that Christmas in Palestine this year has the Christ Child under the rubble. He says: "The child of Bethlehem is our hope. For the children of Gaza and all victims of wars. In Gaza today, God is under the rubble. He is in the operating room. If Christ were to be born today, he would be born under the rubble. We see his image in every child killed and pulled from under the rubble. In every child in incubators."






Thursday Afternoon Bible Study for December


