

Beloved Saints and Sinners,

We are about to journey through the holiest of weeks in Christianity and I invite you to walk with Jesus in new and familiar ways. The various worship opportunities listed above are obvious ways to walk together toward the cross and resurrection, but there are other options that may feed you spiritually as well.

In ancient times, Christians made pilgrimages to Jerusalem, usually during Holy Week. As part of their pilgrim journey, they would walk the route Jesus took with his cross to Calvary, stopping along the way for devotions to commemorate certain events that took place. European Christians on Pilgrimage to the Holy Lands brought back the custom of remembering the Passion through various devotions as early as the 4th century.



Station of the Cross – During times when the Muslim occupation of the Holy Lands made Christian pilgrimage especially difficult or dangerous, the Stations were erected in the local churches as a way of bringing Jerusalem to the people. The word "Stations" come from the Latin word that means to stand. As we come to each "Station" we stop, pray, and contemplate the walk of Jesus to the cross. Following the Stations of the Cross becomes a devotional act for us as we follow Jesus to his death.

The number of "Stations" as varied over the centuries. However, by the 18th century they were fixed at 14. Eight are based directly on events recorded in the Gospel and six are based on references either from the Gospel account or pious legends. Stations are places where people wait while they're going from one place to another. Think of the stations you have stopped at or waited at in your life. Stations are also places where people can stop and wait to reflect on Jesus as he went to die on a cross for us.

All Saints' has two stations of the cross sets. The stations we are using this year are copies of ones commissioned by St. David's Anglican Church in Vancouver, B.C. and created by artist Chris Woods in 1996.

Walking the Labyrinth – Since ancient times the labyrinth has been recognized as a sacred symbol for the journeys in life. For Christian's, the labyrinth symbolizes how the journey of life and faith is challenging, filled with highs and lows, times of knowing the path ahead and other times on paths as yet unknown. The center of the labyrinth is symbolic of the presence of God at the center of our life and faith and the gift of salvation.

While the labyrinth is not mentioned in scripture, it is a tool created to contemplate spiritual concerns, discern our walk with Jesus on the way of love, and become closer to God. The first Christian labyrinth was on the floor of an Algerian Basilica build around 324 (just before the Council of Nicaea). The square design featured a palindrome of text at its center that reads "Sancta Eclesia" meaning "Holy Church". When read from any direction, it

always reads the same, giving hope that the church is always there to anyone who wanders the labyrinth's path.

All Saint's portable labyrinth has been set-up in the Stevens Room off the sanctuary during Lent and will be available through the end of Easter week. It is a modified version of the Chartres Cathedral labyrinth in France that has been welcoming pilgrims since the 1,200's.

These spiritual pilgrimage opportunities show us how God loves us so much that God gives us Jesus, God's one and only Son who accompanies our journey of life and faith. Whoever invests their life in God's Son doesn't die, but is given a whole and everlasting life. This holiest of weeks may you know that Jesus is with you wherever you go, at whatever pace you set, and that he loves you!

Eucharistic Prayer F.A.Q.

Some have asked about the differences in The Book of Common Prayer (1979) and Enriching Our Worship (1998) Eucharistic Prayer options we use in worship. Here are some of the distinctions: BCP Prayer A is closest to the original prayer from 1549; it focuses on Jesus' sacrifice. BCP Prayer B focuses on Jesus' Incarnation. BCP Prayer C is more interactive and penitential. BCP Prayer D is the most comprehensive (and longest) and ancient. It is the only one used by

Episcopalians, Catholics, Lutherans, Methodists, and Eastern Orthodox churches.
EOW Prayers 1, 2 and 3 use expansive language to create a language of prayer for all God's People.

All Saints Community Labyrinth Project F.A.Q. for March 22nd



Pastor Bill introduced the Community Labyrinth Project recently during his remarks at our annual meeting. As we discern and plan, you may have questions about labyrinths and each week we will share a frequently asked question here. Feel free to ask any questions of Pastor Bill or Linda Brown who are both trained labyrinth facilitators by Veriditas the non-profit organization committed to inspiring transformation through the labyrinth experience. The word "Veriditas" originated with Hildegard of Bingen and means "the greening power of life".

What is the history of labyrinths in churches?

The earliest known labyrinth in Christian usage can be found at the basilica of San Reparatus at El Asnam as a roman mosaic. This Roman mosaic labyrinth is believed to date back to the fourth century. Moving forward from the early period, much of the information regarding the use of labyrinths over the next several centuries has disappeared from history, but they reappear as diagrams in ninth century manuscripts of the church. The oldest labyrinth printed during this time period is the 7 circuit Jericho (In a 7-circuit labyrinth there are 7 turns before reaching the center, especially as found in the Christian labyrinth of Jericho) found in a monastery dating back to 822 CE. The second oldest dates back to 871 CE and was printed by German monk Otfrid of Weissenburg. The abbey in Weissenburg where he resided is now officially the city of Alsace in modern France. Otfrid's labyrinth design was the precursor to what has become known as the medieval 11 circuit pattern.

The height of labyrinth usage came in the Middle Ages when they began building them into the floors of churches and cathedrals across Europe, the most well-known of which is that of Chartes Cathedral not all that far from Paris. Following the Reformation, many European labyrinths were destroyed due to iconoclastic notions of their tie to Roman Catholicism. Fast forward a few centuries and labyrinths then experience a renewal of usage in the early 19th century, which is when the labyrinth in Ely Cathedral, Cambridgeshire, England was built. In our current day many have come to express a deep desire to seek a spiritual path and once again turned to the labyrinth as a spiritual practice of discernment, prayer, and meditation. The labyrinth is developing a strong renewal within the Christian faith and it is spreading across the world, especially in the United States.







Thursday Afternoon Bible Study


